


#### Seven Reputable Men

Today we see the beginning of the organizational structure of the Church. The apostles had established a sort of free soup kitchen in Jerusalem. A problem quickly arose because of a division among the Jews. Those who were born inside of Israel tended to look down on those born outside. The non-Israeli Jews — aka "Hellenists" or Greeks — tried to make themselves more "orthodox" to demonstrate their faith. This split continued among converts to Christianity.

The apostles resolved to settle the squabble by appointing seven waiters to see to an equitable food distribution. In time they would be called "Deacons". Later the church would also ordain women as deaconesses.

### Whoever Has Seen Me Has Seen the Father

Philip plays only a small role in the Gospels, but here his role is pivotal. Jesus has warned his apostles that he is leaving – probably a reference to his death and ascension. Philip responds to Jesus' claim that they "have seen the Father". Like the other apostles, he has not comprehended the depth of Christ's identity. He can see only the man and not the God. Our Lord expresses the nature of his person and his unity with the Father. It is a clear statement that he is God. In the beauty of Jesus we see the qualities of God because Jesus is divine. What do we see in Jesus? Surely among his attributes are love, mercy, compassion, strength, humility, self-sacrifice...in short all that is good and nothing that is wrong. © 2000 by Father Richard Lonsdale

# UPCOMING EVENTS

Missionary Image of Our Lady of Guadalupe

The Immaculate Conception Parish of Cherokee is hosting and displaying the Missionary Image of Our Lady of Guadalupe during the month of May. This missionary image is a 4' by 6' actual replica of the original, miraculous tilma (cloak) of Blessed Juan Diego. Veneration will be available for visitors daily, Monday - Friday 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., Saturday 8 a.m. to noon; except when the image is being shared.

There are only four such images in the world and Pope St. John Paul II stated in one of his homilies, "Now Our Lady accompanies each one of her daughters and sons with her motherly presence. I ask her to 'visit' as a 'pilgrim of faith' – each and every diocese, parish and family in America."



Pope Saint John Paul II prayed for conversions and a culture of life and civilization of love. He wants the faithful to pray for an end to abortions and for the conversion of millions of hearts to Jesus. It is known that those who venerate this image are charged with the energy of faith.



The bishops of the United States have called upon all the faithful to renew their belief and worship of the Eucharist. Each month the members of the three local churches will have the opportunity to pray during the exposition of the Eucharist.

- \* Sunday, May 7, 2023: St. Joseph, Salix, Noon to 2 PM (in the daily Mass chapel)
- \* **Sunday, June 4, 2023**: St. John, Onawa, 10 AM to 2 PM (in the main church)



Fátima was named for a 12th century Moorish princess, and since 1917 it has been one of the greatest Marian shrines in the world, visited by thousands of pilgrims annually. On May 13, 1917, and in each subsequent month until October of that year, three young peasant children, Lucia dos Santos and her cousins Francisco and Jacinta Marto, reportedly saw a woman who identified herself as the Lady of the Rosary. During her appearances, Our Lady of Fátima supposedly gave the children three secrets and repeatedly exhorted them to pray the rosary for world peace and emphasized the necessity of devotions to her Immaculate Heart in order for souls to be saved. The children also said that she told them God would perform a miracle on October 13 so that people would believe. A crowd estimated at about 70,000 gathered at Fátima on that day and witnessed what has been described as a miraculous solar phenomenon in which the Sun appeared to fall toward Earthsometimes called the Miracle of the Sun—immediately after the lady's final appearance to the children.

After initial opposition, the bishop of Leiria on October 13, 1930, accepted the children's visions as the appearance of the Virgin Mary; in the same year, papal indulgences were granted to pilgrims. The content of the devotion includes frequent recitation of the rosary and devotion to the Immaculate Heart of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

At the end of the 20th century, there was growing speculation concerning the three secrets Our Lady of Fátima allegedly revealed to the children in 1917. Though two of the messages had been disclosed in the 1940s commonly interpreted as the prediction of the end of World War I and the start of World War II and the rise and fall of communism — the third had been kept secret by the Vatican, giving rise to numerous theories. In May 2000 it was finally announced that the third message was the Virgin Mary's vision of the May 13, 1981 assassination attempt on Pope John Paul II, and the pope publicly credited Our Lady of Fátima for saving his life.
