

# THE ELEVENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

### FROM FR. MICHAEL

## Gospel from the Weekend:


According to Mark's gospel, Jesus began teaching in parables shortly after appointing the twelve. A parable is a wise saying or short fictitious story used by Jesus to set forth His teaching. Parables may contain allegorical elements. Today we hear the parables of the growing seed and of the mustard seed.

Jesus is telling His disciples about His Church: The preaching of the gospel (the generously scattered seed) will unfailingly yield its fruit, independent of who sows or reaps – it is God who gives the growth (1 Corinthians 3:5-9).

This also refers to the action of grace in each soul: God silently works a transformation in each one of us causing us to make resolutions which shape our soul. We resolve to be faithful, surrender ourselves, respond to grace. Our callings and responses may be different as we are individuals (Ephesians 4:11-13). Even though we must make the decision to become a follower of Christ, it is the Holy Spirit who, working within us, gives a supernatural tone to our thoughts, desires and actions.

The main meaning of this parable has to do with the contrast between the great and the small. The seed of the Kingdom of God on earth is something very tiny to begin with (Luke 12:32; Acts 1:19); but it will grow to be a big tree. The seed is planted in Peter and the apostles, has set its roots in Rome, and has grown to be a big tree; one which encompasses the whole world; a great multitude which "no man can number" (Revelation 7:9).

This growth also occurs in each soul. As predicted in the responsorial psalm Psalm 92:13. "The righteous grow like a cedar in Lebanon." To allow the mercy of God to exalt us, to make us grow, we must make ourselves small, humble.



"To what shall we compare the kingdom of God, or what parable can we use for it? It is like a mustard seed that, when it is sown in the ground, is the smallest of all the seeds on the earth. But once it is sown, it springs up and becomes the largest of plants."- Mk 4:30-32b

EMMAUS CAMP JULY 21<sup>ST</sup> THROUGH JULY 25<sup>TH</sup>, is a camp intended for Teenagers who are prepared to draw closer to Christ and go deeper into their Faith. The intention of Emmaus is better suited to people who have already experience a conference such as SEEK or Steubenville. Students who are finishing 10<sup>th</sup> through 12<sup>th</sup> grade are welcome to attend.

EMMAUS camp will be held at Creighton University Retreat Center, 16493 Contrail Avenue, Griswold lowa. The cost is \$400 per student. Attendees can apply for a scholarship between June 22<sup>nd</sup> and July 2<sup>nd</sup>. If a scholarship is awarded, the applicant will be reimbursed up to a maximum of 25% of the camp cost after the applicant has attended EMMAUS Camp. The amount of money granted could be less than 25%. Registration is open on June 22<sup>nd</sup> from 9:00am to 9:00pm. It will close after 24 students have been registered. The registration process will require one referral form by a priest, DRE or a youth minister. Parishes will be required for collecting registration forms, T-shirt Orders and payments, done online, Parish not parent must register the child.

This camp is held on beautiful 157 acres wonderful atmosphere and beautiful cabins place to relax and become closer to God. Forms are available in the office for anyone who is interested. In the United States, Flag Day is celebrated on June 14. It commemorates the adoption of the flag of the United States on June 14, 1777, by resolution of the Second Continental Congress. The Flag Resolution, passed on June 14, 1777, stated: "Resolved, That the flag of the thirteen United States be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field, representing a new constellation."

The United States Army also celebrates the U.S. Army birthday on this date; Congress adopted "the American continental army" after reaching a consensus position in the Committee of the Whole on June 14, 1775.
